

It sure is a busy time in and out of school at the moment. We were so proud of all our ākonga last week representing themselves and us as a school so positively at Taiopenga, the local Kapa Haka Festival. At school and in the Board room we are working hard on the structure and make up of our school for 2025. At this time of year people start to wonder about what next year will look like. We are working through changes to our National Curriculum, local funding and a changing roll size, and what they might mean for our school next year. I think we are about 2 - 3 weeks away from being able to make firm decisions about how many classes we will be running, who will be in them, and who will be teaching them. As you can imagine this is also a challenge for the staff and I to navigate but also offers a range of opportunities for us to strengthen our organisation. We will get this information out to you as soon as is practicable and appreciate your support with this. We recieved our attendance report for Term 3 this week and we're happy to say it has improved by 16% from the same time last year. We had 57% of our students attending school at least 90% of the term. The key message from the Ministry of Education is for us all to remember that regular attendance helps build and maintain a child's learning and positive daily habits and routines, as well as promoting wellbeing by connecting them to their peers and learning new things

together.

A big thank you to the Rodeo Association for their financial support of the pool. The repairs that went on last winter totalled about \$13000 in the end and \$5000 was donated to the school to support this. Phill and I are working on getting the pool summer ready again and are hoping to have it open in the next couple of weeks for the students to enjoy, once it warms up again.

We are really interested in hearing from any families that would like to hire pool keys this summer. We need a good number of parties to be interested for this to be viable. If enough families can be found, we will organise a duty roster system as the pool requires 3 hourly testing when in operation to be compliant. Once we have a gauge on the interest we can make decisions about the price and/or the ability to stay open for the summer.

Reading: All students are taken every day to read specific leveled books, or play with letters and words with the teacher. In the meantime, their classmates work at various stations around the classroom. Here they practise writing, work on words or sentences, and refine their fine motor skills.

Writing: With many new students, we have been focusing on leaving big spaces between our words, and are trying to find the first sound of each word. Students who have been at school for a while, are encouraged to use the word "and", or "because" to help extend and add detail to their story. The students are writing about personal recounts of things they have done.

Maths: We are learning about numbers and what they mean by using egg cartons as ten frames. Many are working on basic facts to 5, 10, and then to 20. Some students are also using money to add two digit numbers together.

Aaron Harrison - Year 7 - 8



The kids have been practicing walking with weighted bottles in their backpacks to get used to the possible weight they will have to carry for camp.


