
Rewarewa Year 4 - 5 || Julian Mason



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Kids Edible Gardens Term 2

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This term it is Ti Koukas' turn to have a go with KEGs! We have a bit of weeding to do now that the gardens have had some rain and the soil is still warm enough for some good growth. We are making an effort to improve ths soil so that we can grow some good vegetables in future. Ti Kouka have helped to weed and top: up some of the beds with compost that has been made on site and we have added leaves, paper, food scraps(particularly feijoa skins), and other materials to both worm farms and watered this with "worm wee". There are more baby worms in the worm farm now but we hope to have even more as we provide them with good food.

In week 3 we made some feijoa muffins. Here is the recipe if you would like to make them at home:



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FABULOUS FEIJOA MUFFINS

Ingredients 75g butter, melted 1 cup finely chopped feijoa flesh 2 large eggs finely grated rind of 1 orange 1/4 cup orange juice 3/4 cup sugar 2 cups self-raising flour 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 tablespoon sugar



Method

- 1. Heat oven to 200°C
- 2. Heat the butter in a large bowl until it is liquid.
- 3. Halve the feijoas and scoop out the central part with a teaspoon.
- 4. Chop (or mash) feijoa into pieces no bigger than peas. Pack into cup measure, then mix this into the melted butter with a fork.
- 5. Add the unbeaten eggs, orange (or lemon) rind, and the juice of the orange (made up to volume with a little lemon juice if necessary). Mix until everything is combined.
- 6. Mix the sugar and self-raising flour in another container. Sprinkle it over the egg mixture, then fold it in without overmixing. (add a little extra juice or milk to reach usual muffin consistency.)
- 7. Divide the mixture between greased muffin pans.
- Mix the cinnamon and second measure of sugar, and sprinkle it on the muffins.
- Bake for 10-15 minutes, until the centres spring back when pressed.
